BIOS / WORKS / VENUES

I hate you, I hate you, I hate you, because I don't hate you; I love you... is an off site project organised by Artspace NZ and Michael Lett in dialogue with Ary Jansen as part of Auckland Pride Festival's visual arts programme.

The title is borrowed from emerging Auckland based artist Ary Jansen's video trilogy "What makes me deserving of this space?" which is constructed as an open letter from a transgender son to the Art World as paternal figure. Within rising selfie-consumerist culture, the project revisits the psychoanalytical foundations of self-perception, self-image, attachment and intimacy, and is a call to reconsider the politics of representation within a queer climate.

Today "hate" is visibly injected into everyday politics. Racist, misogynist, homophobic, and sexist arguments bombard the public. From the Orlando massacre to the gay bashings in Nigeria, police violence in Istanbul's Pride Walk to the clash between police and "No Pride in Prisons" protesters during Auckland's Pride Parade, this project acknowledges the victims of hate, supporters of radical love and global activist contributions from LGBTQI organisations from all over the world.

Breaking free of the enclosure of the gallery space, the project intends to penetrate into the everyday life of the city, developing intimate conversations between visitors, hosting venues and participating artists. The collaborative dialogue between Artspace NZ and Michael Lett gallery with hosting venues on Cross St. will generate an open exhibition ground for presenting recent works from locally based artists with queer perspectives.

Jordana Bragg (b 1994, Auckland, New Zealand) holds a BFA (Honours) from Massey University, Wellington. Bragg is a performance-based video artist who has exhibited across Aotearoa New Zealand. In 2015 they participated in City Gallery Wellington's panel discussion 'Choker: 20 years on', in association with the Fiona Pardington exhibition 'A Beautiful Hesitation'. In 2016 they participated in the Fourth Wave of Feminism seminar, co-hosted by Enjoy Gallery and The Dowse, and facilitated the exhibition 'Berlin-Wellington: Friends are artists'. They have recently opened MEANWHILE Artist Run Initiative, with recent Massey University graduates Jesse Bowling and Callum Devlin.

Xun Cao (b. 1990, Jiangxi, China) graduated with an MFA from Elam School of Fine Arts in 2016 and currently lives and works in Auckland. Recent exhibitions include 'White Night Arts Festival' (Q Theatre Show, Auckland, New Zealand (group), 2016), 'The Colour of Your Hearts is What Matters' (Studio One Gallery, Auckland, New Zealand (group), 2016), 'Elam Grad Show 2015' (Elam A building, Elam School of Fine Arts, Auckland New Zealand, 2016), 'Queering Ecologies' (Allpress Gallery, Auckland New Zealand (group), 2015).

Juliet Carpenter (b. 1990, Waipukurau, New Zealand) graduated from the University of Auckland's Elam School of Fine Arts in 2013. Carpenter's practice is concerned with the dramaturgy of selfhood within language, film and technology. Juliet's work often foregrounds sexual and emotional experiences, amplifying and exploring qualities of these narratives that are considered hysterical or disturbed. Recent exhibitions include 'Standard Error' with Gregory Kan + ZK Steiner-Fox and Bilijana Popovic (Glovebox, Auckland, 2016), LABOR ZERO LABOR, video Programme, Triangle France, France (group), Silent Treatment (Hastings City Art Gallery, 2016) (solo), Inhabiting Space (Adam Art Gallery, Wellington, 2016) (group), Ingenue as part of the LAY programme (Blindside, Melbourne, 2016), summer of supine, (Blue Oyster Art Project Space, Dunedin, 2015) (solo). Fiona Clark (b. 1954, Taranaki, New Zealand) graduated from the University of Auckland's Elam School of Fine Arts in 1975. Clark is also a central member of Friends of Waitara River Inc.. an environmental organisation that campaigns to protect the quality of water in Waitara river and immediate surrounding areas. In 2016 she took part in presentations at Artspace NZ, SIART 9 Biennale at Museo Nacional de Arte in Bolivia and Michael Lett. Recent group exhibitions include Wunderrūma at the Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tamaki (2015) and Bloom at the Dowse, Lower Hutt (2011). Between 2002-2006 Clark exhibited a series of solo exhibitions, titled GO GIRL, at public art institutions across Australasia, including at the Dunedin Public Art Gallery (2006), Whangarei Art Museum (2005) and Govett-Brewster Art Gallery (2002). Clark currently lives and works in Tikorangi, Taranaki, New Zealand.

Owen Connors (b. 1992, Greymouth, New Zealand) lives and works in Auckland. He studied at the Elam School of Fine Arts and Auckland University's Writing Studies Department. Recent shows and work include 'New Perspectives' (Artspace NZ, Auckland, 2016), 'fuck me: sex under capitalism,' #1 (Time Out bookstore, Auckland, 2015), #2 as part of 'Shadow of the Dome of Pleasure' (Artspace NZ, Auckland, 2015), and #3 (RM gallery, Auckland, 2016). Recent writing featured in: brief, desperate, matters, fuck me, Argos Aotearoa and T.I.N.A as part of babaloose (Glasgow).

Ary Jansen (b. 1993) graduated from Auckland University of Technology with a Bachelor of Visual Arts in 2016. Ary Jansen uses his identity as a middle-class Pakeha trans person to analyse hierarchies. He works on recording and collecting footage, writing voice-overs and recording soundtracks simultaneously-like having several tabs open on an internet browser. He is interested in the way technology constructs the way that we think, not only as a tool used by oppressors to survey and categorise but as one that can be seized upon by the oppressed to disrupt, critique and organise against this oppression.

Paul Johns (b. 1951, Christchurch, New Zealand) lives and works in Christchurch. He

graduated from the University of Canterbury School of Fine Arts with a Diploma in Fine Arts in 1974. Johns has exhibited widely in group and solo exhibitions throughout New Zealand including 'THE BILL: For Collective Unconscious' (Artspace NZ, Auckland, 2016), 'All is well' (64zero3, Christchurch, 2008), 'Paul Johns' (64zero3, Christchurch, 2006), 'SCAPE Biennial' (Christchurch, 2008), 'Spaghetti Junction' (64zero3, Christchurch, 2007), 'Ficciones' (64zero3, Christchurch, 2007), 'Telecom Prospect' (Wellington, 2004).
